Report on the main findings of the FAIR survey



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Introduction

This report presents the findings of a survey conducted in the frame of the FAIR project, which assessed respondents' awareness and perceptions of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights.

The project "EU Charter of Fundamental Rights: Awareness raising and Instruments to promote a culture of Rights" (FAIR), is carried out by a consortium of 9 organisations based in nine different EU countries – Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Slovenia, and Spain. It aims to:

- **map gaps and barriers** by identifying obstacles to the implementation and use of the Charter at the national level in defending fundamental rights
- **increase awareness** by educating the general population about the content and provisions of the Charter, and
- **promote community building** by encouraging networking among civil society organisations, experts, professionals, and public stakeholders.

The present report is a component of the project's mapping activity. It aims to supplement the insights gained within the *Comparative analysis of gaps in the implementation of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights*¹ which analyses the extent to which the EU Charter is being used domestically by policymakers, lawyers and judges, legislators, and civil society organisations in the participating countries. It also adds to the perspectives gained at focus group discussions and national seminars that supplement the study with qualitative information about main recurring themes, identified needs, obstacles, and possible promising practices available at the national level.

As a next step, these findings will feed into a comparative report that would bring out the common grounds for:

- 1) engaging key stakeholders and implementing public awareness activities to foster a rights culture and
- 2) for developing a practical tool to support civil society organizations, activists, experts, and other relevant stakeholders interested in launching campaigns on fundamental rights across the EU.

The present report offers a detailed analysis of the survey's 21 questions, providing a comprehensive overview of collective responses while identifying significant variations and cross-national similarities.

Methodology

The primary objectives of the FAIR Survey were to collect essential information regarding individuals' awareness and knowledge of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights, assess their understanding of how they can apply it in situations where their fundamental rights are breached, and evaluate their willingness to know more on the topic. The survey further aimed to collect feedback and input on how the Charter's visibility can be improved.

To fulfill these goals, Center for the Study of Democracy as a task leader developed and the project consortium agreed on a questionnaire of 21 questions grouped around the three aims, particularly to assess:

1. the respondents' main demographic characteristics such as country of origin, gender, age, and level of education;
2. their level of awareness about the Charter's content and goals. Some of the questions were designed to compare self-reported versus de facto knowledge.
3. The third group of questions asked about participants' willingness to know more and their estimation of the communication channels that might effectively promote the Charter.

The target group was pre-selected to cover the FAIR consortium countries: Belgium, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Spain, and Slovenia. It was not, however, limited geographically and respondents from all over the world could share their input. The questionnaire targeted diverse respondents who might have used the Charter either for personal or professional and activism purposes: national and local authorities, legal practitioners, civil society organisations, activists, as well as the general public.

The survey was carried out online. In order to most effectively achieve the survey's objectives, the Center for the Study of Democracy decided to employ the functionalities of the LimeSurvey platform. It was chosen since it offers highly customisable surveying software with multilingual support being simultaneously a GDPR-compliant solution.

Being multilingual, the survey was disseminated in eleven languages (Bulgarian, Croatian, Dutch, English, French, Greek, Italian, Portuguese, Slovenian, Spanish, and Turkish), primarily to target partner countries within the project. Respondents were given the option to select their preferred language and indicate their country of residence from the listed options, with an additional 'Other' category available for those residing outside these countries. Survey responses were compiled based on respondents' selections, presuming that knowledge and awareness of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights, the main subject of inquiry, are influenced by respondents' political and legislative context. Survey questions were predominantly close-ended with

Data collection took place from 1 September 2024 to 15 October 2024, initially scheduled to conclude on 31 October 2024, but was extended by an additional seven days. To ensure

confidentiality and anonymity, no personal data was collected, except for an optional email field at the end of the survey for participants wishing to receive further information on the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights.

The survey followed the ethical guidelines as put in Center for the Study of Democracy's Code of Research Ethics.² It prioritised the confidentiality and anonymity of respondents, ensuring that no personal data was collected without the participants' consent.

The sample for the survey was selected through social media advertising and targeted recruitment of respondents from the FAIR consortium's partner networks. The survey dissemination aimed to be unbiased; however, due to the low response rate within the campaign which targeted the general public, the partner countries disseminated it among their partner and contact lists. The project partners being members of FRANET, may have potentially targeted groups already interested in fundamental rights and possessing some knowledge of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. Additionally, as partners utilised their existing media platforms and networks to distribute and promote the survey, there is a possibility that fundamental rights-based organisations and individuals were disproportionately reached through the campaign. Consequently, it is possible that the survey was completed by individuals already engaged with the topic, potentially skewing the results and affecting the representativeness of the survey.

Survey promotion followed a preliminary set sample size per country which, although not representative, aimed to pursue a proportional completion rate among countries. It aimed to ensure equal distribution, accounting for differences in national population sizes. The table below shows the response target that each partner followed:

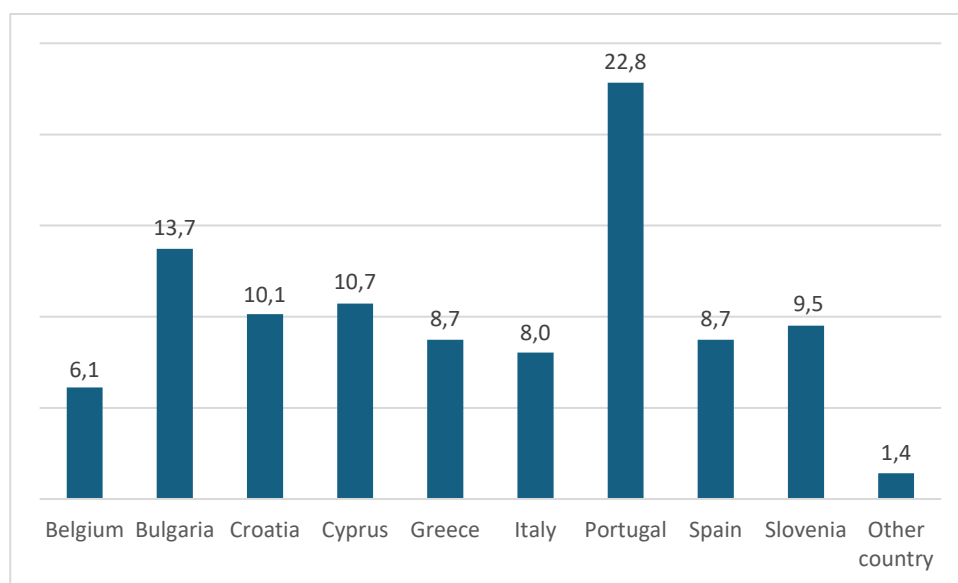

While the survey was open, national partners received weekly updates on response numbers, allowing them to adjust their promotion strategies as needed to meet targets. As a result, the survey was closed with 1,568 completed questionnaires and 593 non-completed.

Survey data was analysed with the support of the SPSS data analysis programme. Country results (see Annexes) are derived by crossing each question's responses with the countries of residence pointed out as answers to the first question. This approach was adopted for being most adequate since the respondents' nationality could not be determined by the language they used, due to certain language overlaps. Additionally, many respondents preferred to use the English version of the questionnaire.

The present analysis is based on the overall survey results. Nevertheless, some country-specific nuances were added where they deviate from the general trends.

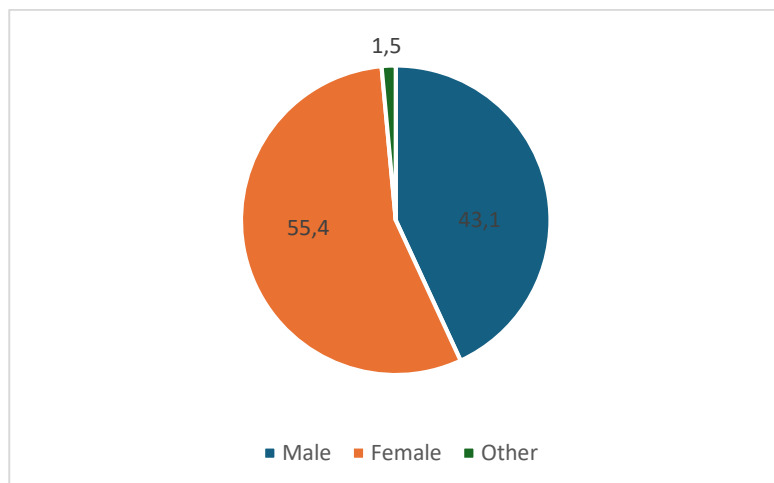
Figure 1: Share of respondents by declared country in which they reside.

The first five questions of the survey were designed to establish the demographic profile of the respondents. Figure 1 illustrates the answers to Question 1, 'Which country do you live in?'. The largest proportion of respondents reside in Portugal (22.8%), followed by Bulgaria (13.7%), Cyprus (10.7%), Croatia (10.1%), Slovenia (9.5%), Greece and Spain (each with 8.7%), Italy (8%), and Belgium, which has the smallest proportion of respondents at 6.1%. An additional 1.4% of respondents selected the 'Other country' option. They predominantly came from other EU countries outside the project consortium. Germany was most represented among them.

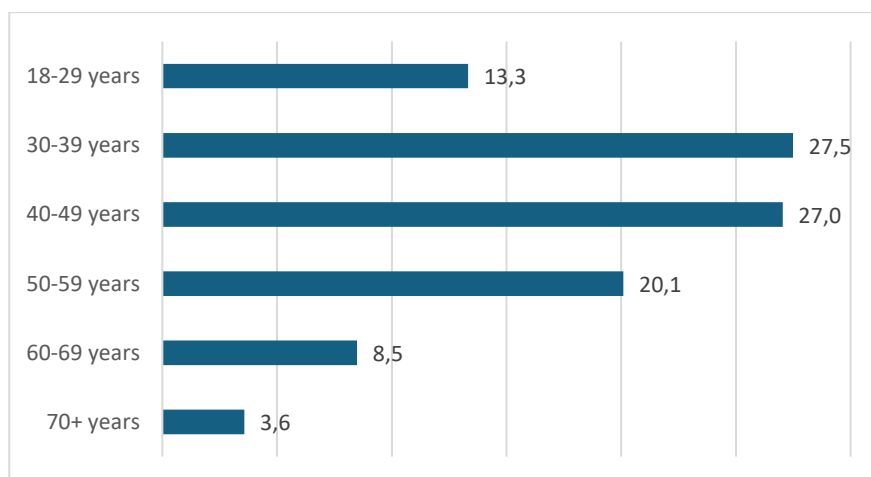
Figure 2: Share of respondents by gender

Figure 2 illustrates the responses to Question 2, “Your gender is”, indicating that 55.4% of respondents identify as women, 43.1% as men, and 1.5% selected the 'Other' option. The predominance of women among survey respondents is consistent across countries, with the highest proportions observed in Croatia (77.4%), Italy (71.4%), and Greece (65%). Portugal is the only exception, with men comprising 69% of Portuguese respondents.

Figure 3: Share of respondents by age group

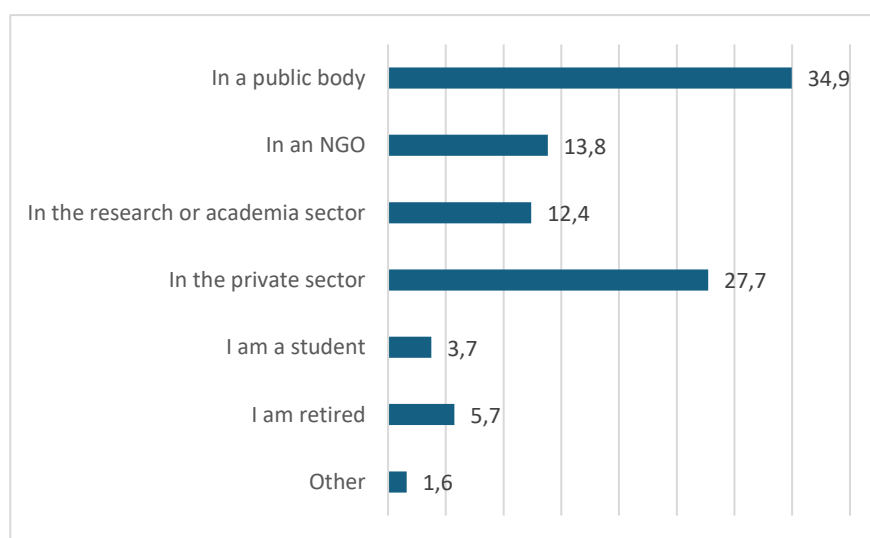

Figure 3 depicts the responses to Question 3, 'What is your age?'. The two largest age groups among respondents are 30-39 years, comprising 27.5%, and 40-49 years, comprising 27%. These age groups (together with the group aged 50-59 years in Italy, Portugal and Slovenia) consistently represent the largest proportions of respondents across countries, which may be attributed to these age ranges

encompassing the majority of the workforce. Additionally, respondents aged 50-59 years make up 20.1%, followed by those aged 18-29 years at 13.3%, those aged 60-69 years at 8.5%, and individuals over 70 years, who represent the smallest proportion at 3.6%.

Figure 4: Share of respondents by declared occupation

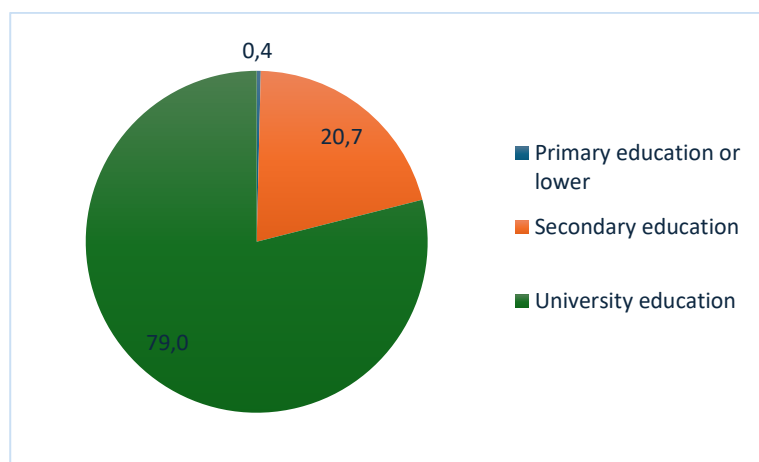

Figure 4 presents the responses to Question 4, ‘What is your main occupation?’, outlining the professional sectors of the respondents. The largest group is employed within public institutions, representing 34.9% of respondents, followed by 27.7% in the private sector. Additionally, 13.8% work in NGOs, and 12.4% are engaged in research or academia. A further 5.7% of respondents are retired, 3.7% are students, and 1.6% indicated that they belong to a different occupational category.

No specific trend in occupational distribution is observed across countries. However, certain countries exhibit a notable concentration within specific professional sectors. For example, 86.6% of respondents from Portugal are employed in public institutions, while 53.3% of Italian respondents, 52.1% of Bulgarian respondents, and 48.9% of Greek respondents work in the private sector. Therefore, the high concentrations of respondents in the public and private sectors should be taken into account when evaluating the representativeness of the survey results for the respective countries.

Figure 5: Share of respondents by highest level of education



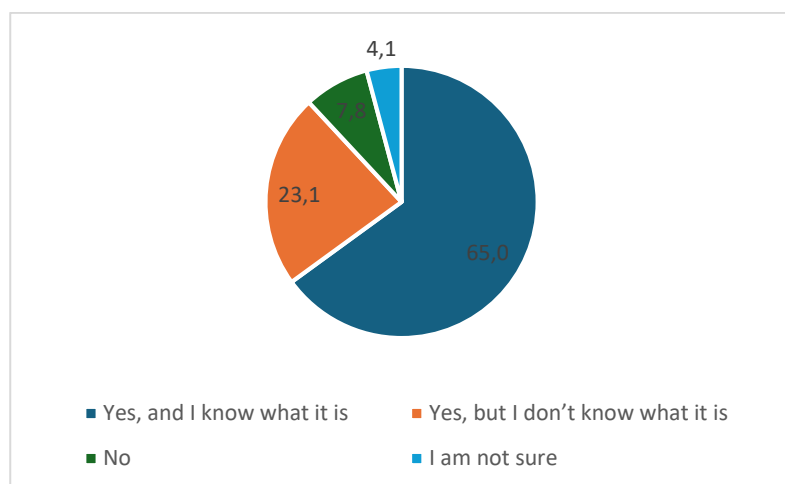

Figure 5 presents the responses to Question 5, which assesses 'Educational Attainment' among the respondents. The data indicate that a substantial majority, 79%, hold a university degree, while 20.7% have attained secondary education, and only a minor proportion, 0.4%, have completed primary education or lower levels. This trend is largely consistent across countries, with the percentage of respondents holding university degrees remaining above 80% in all cases except for Portugal, where 48.03% possess a university degree, and 51.4% have achieved secondary education.

Survey Results

This section provides an in-depth analysis of the respondent's knowledge of the Charter and their assessment of its importance in their personal and professional lives. By examining key trends, patterns, and country-specific insights, this analysis sheds light on the challenges and opportunities in ensuring the Charter's principles are upheld. The findings offer valuable perspectives for policymakers, legal professionals, and stakeholders committed to strengthening the fundamental rights framework within the EU.

Figure 6: Self-declared awareness of the EU Charter (%)

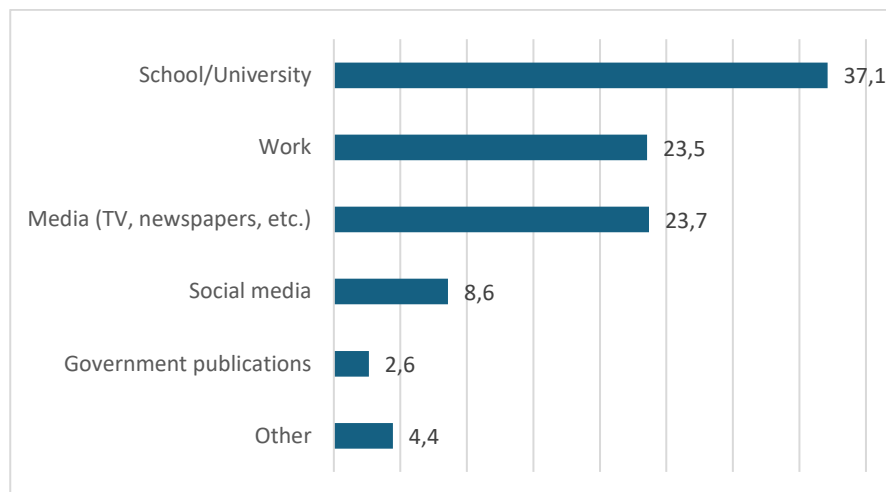

Figure 6 depicts the extent of respondents' awareness of the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU. A majority of respondents, specifically 65%, indicate that they have previously heard of the Charter and understand its purpose, while 23.1% report having heard of the Charter but are unfamiliar with its meaning. Conversely, only 7.8% state that they have not heard of the Charter, and 4.1% are uncertain. The countries demonstrating the highest levels of awareness of the Charter and its content include Greece (81%), Croatia (77.4%), Belgium (75%), and Portugal (72.9%). In contrast, countries with the lowest levels of understanding of the Charter and its essence are Bulgaria (49.3%), Cyprus (53.6%), and Italy (53.7%). Additionally, the highest percentage of respondents who have not heard of the Charter is observed in Cyprus, at 14.9%. These results should, however, be interpreted while minding the specifics of the sample described in the methodology above. The networks of the project partners which were one of the major dissemination channels, are very likely to be comprised of people who have profound knowledge of the Charter to a higher extent than the general population. As already mentioned, the campaign targeting the general population registered a modest response rate. This finding might need further research within the qualitative research phase to check the hypotheses of whether this is due to factors such as the irrelevance of the Charter for people's agenda, their uncertainty about the document and their knowledge about it; or any other.

The following four questions aim to further assess the participants' knowledge about the Charter's scope and application, as well as to gain insights about their perception of the Charter's importance. These questions were not asked to people who have not heard about the Charter.

Figure 7: “Where did you first hear about the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights?” (%)

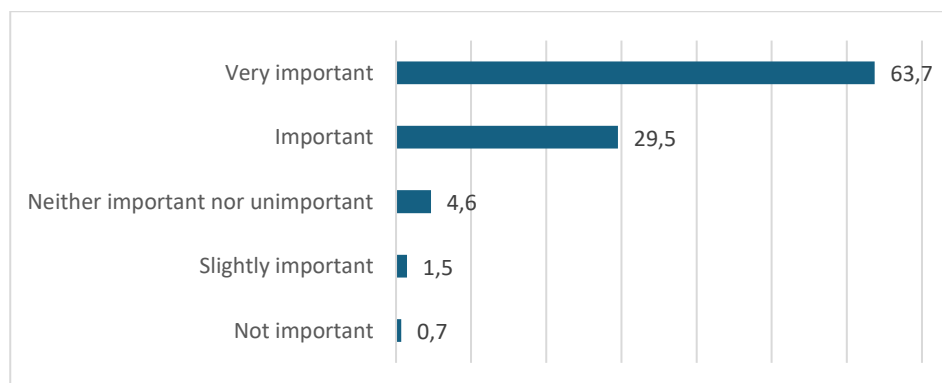

The sources through which respondents have first heard about the EU Charter are visualised in Figure 7. The largest proportion of respondents, 37.1%, report that they were initially introduced to the Charter in school or university. A further 23.7% indicate that they first encountered it through media sources, such as television and newspapers, while 23.5% became aware of it in a professional context. Additionally, 8.6% report first heard about the Charter on social media, 2.6% through governmental publications, and 4.4% via other means. When asked to specify which these other means were, respondents most often pointed to activism or NGO work and family or friends.

These figures vary significantly across countries, highlighting the need for tailored approaches to promoting the Charter in different national contexts. For instance, in Belgium and Greece, 65.2% and 61.1% of respondents, respectively, first learned about the Charter at school or university. In contrast, the majority of respondents in Bulgaria (37.3%) and Slovenia (32.1%) were introduced to the Charter through the media. Meanwhile, 53.9% of respondents in Croatia first encountered the Charter at work, while in Cyprus, social media was the primary source for 27.5% of respondents.

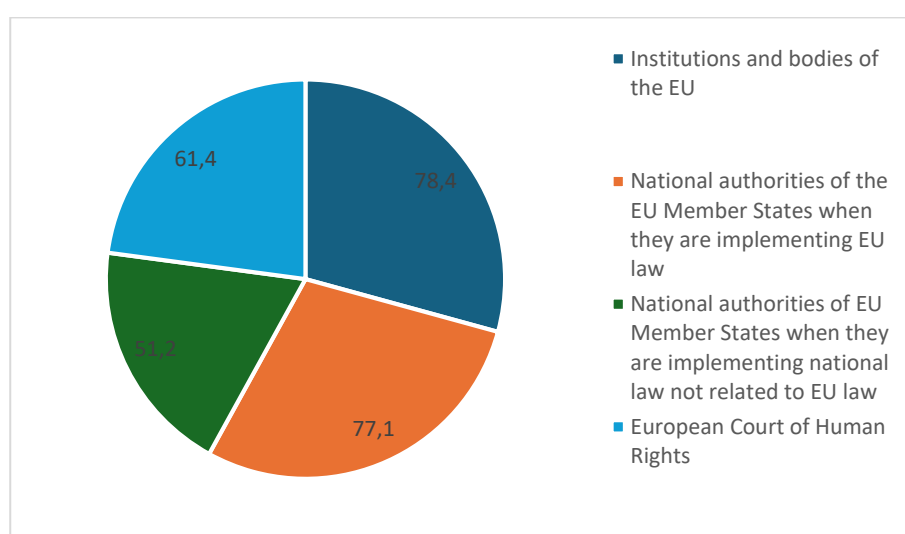
Figure 8: Perceived importance of the EU Charter (%)

Figure 8 evaluates respondents' perceptions of the Charter through Question 8, which asks, 'Do you believe the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights is important?' Of the respondents, 63.7% consider it to be very important, and 29.5% regard it as important. A smaller portion, 4.6%, view it as neither important nor unimportant, while 1.5% find it slightly important, and only 0.7% perceive the Charter as unimportant. The highest evaluation of the Charter's importance is observed among Cypriot respondents, 75.5% of whom regard it as very important.

Figure 9: Knowledge about Charter application (%)



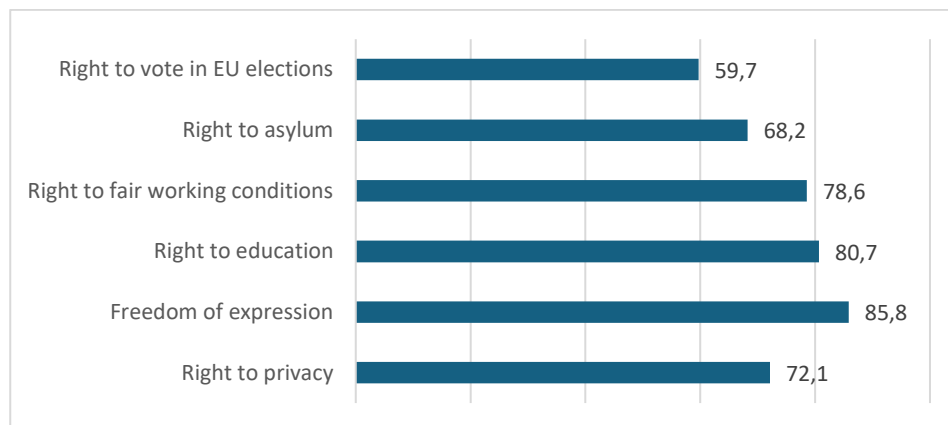

Figure 9 presents responses to the question 'Which of the following do you believe are obligated to apply the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights?' Respondents could select all options they considered applicable. It aims to check for mismatches between self-reported and actual knowledge. Studies often report that people confuse the EU Charter with the European Convention on Human Rights.³ This survey confirmed this observation. While approximately two-thirds of the respondents say they have heard about the Charter and know what it is, a similar share (61.4%) identify the European Court of Human Rights as the body responsible for applying the EU Charter. Additionally, 51.2% believe it is the responsibility of national authorities even when implementing national law unrelated to EU legislation.

The results also indicate that 78.4% believe EU institutions and bodies are required to apply the Charter, while 77.1% think this obligation also falls on the national authorities of EU Member States when implementing EU law. These two options consistently remain the most frequently selected by respondents across countries as the most relevant to the application of the EU Charter suggesting that respondents are well aware of the Charter's application. Belgium stands out as the country in which respondents most definitely point out the Charter's application.

Figure 10 Knowledge about EU Charter's content (%)

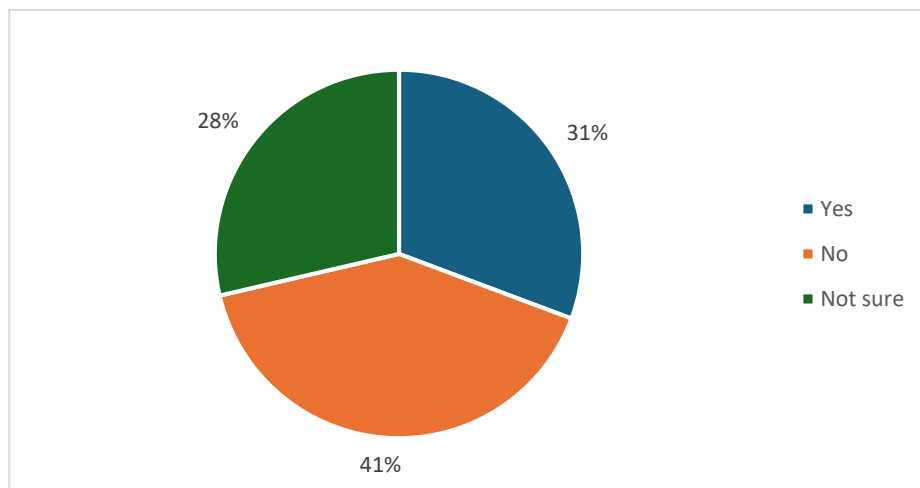

Figure 10 illustrates the distribution of responses to Question 10: 'Which of the following rights do you believe are included in the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights?' where respondents could select multiple answers. This question also aimed at identifying mismatches between self-reported and actual knowledge this time concerning Charter's content.

All listed options were highly associated with the EU Charter. Specifically, 85.8% of respondents selected the right to freedom of expression, 80.7% selected the right to education, 78.6% chose the right to fair working conditions, 72.1% identified the right to privacy, 68.2% selected the right to asylum, and 59.7% chose the right to vote in EU elections. These results suggest that not all parts of the Charter are equally familiar but this issue, similarly to the issues covered by the previous questions, has common trends but also differences at the national level. For example, despite the right to vote at EU elections is less associated with the Charter in general in the project countries, only 62.2% of the Italian respondents and 58.1% of the Bulgarian ones believe that the Charter guarantees the right to asylum. The right to privacy remains outside the EU Charter according to 47.6% of the Italian respondents. Therefore, a Charter promotion campaign should be tailored to the national specifics suggested by the national-level survey results.

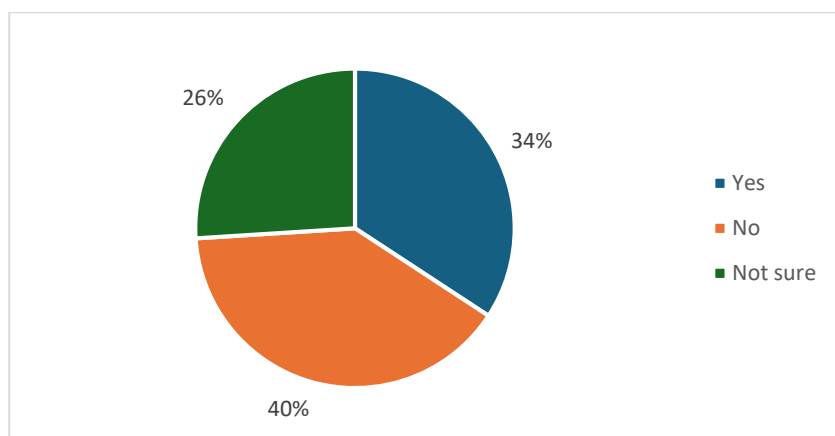
Figure 11: Have you ever faced a situation where you felt your rights under the EU Charter were violated? (%)

Figure 11 corresponds to Question 11, where respondents were asked if they have ever faced a situation where they felt their rights under the EU Charter were violated. To which 40,7% responded with No, 30,7% with Yes, and 28,6% were not sure. These results, indicated by the significant proportion of responses for each option, suggest that individuals may lack awareness regarding the circumstances in which their rights could be violated and what constitutes a violation. Noteworthy examples include Cypriot respondents, 59.4% of whom report having felt that their rights were violated. A potential promotional campaign should focus its attention on people who were unsure if their rights have been violated.

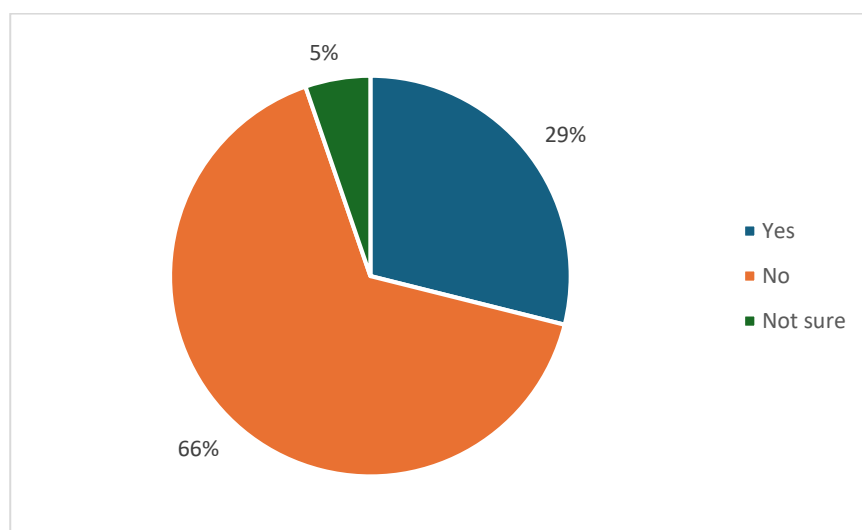
Figure 12: Do you know where to report a violation of your rights under the EU Charter? (%)

Figure 12 presents the distribution of responses to Question 12: 'Would you know where to report a violation of your rights under the EU Charter?' The results show that 39.8% of respondents are unaware of where to report violations of their rights should they arise. In contrast, 34.2% state that they would know where to report such violations, while 26% remain uncertain. According to the country data, Spain, Bulgaria, and Italy represent the countries with the highest levels of unawareness regarding this matter, with 55.5%, 52.3%, and 51.3% of respondents, respectively, reporting a lack of knowledge.

Figure 13: Have you ever used the EU Charter as a reference in legal, professional, or personal matters? (%)

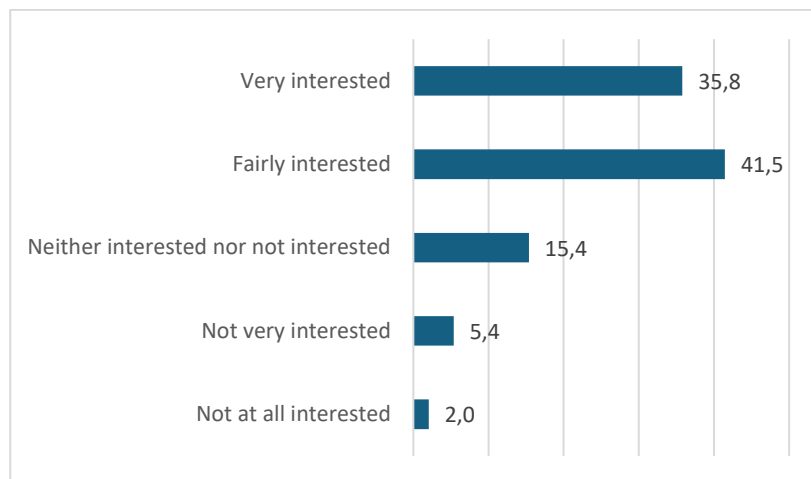

Figure 13 illustrates the responses to Question 13: 'Have you ever used the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights as a reference in legal, professional, or personal matters?' A significant majority, 65.8%, report that they have not used the Charter in these contexts, while 28.9% have, and 5.3% are uncertain. Among the countries with the lowest levels of engagement with the EU Charter in legal, professional, or personal matters are Italy (79.5%), Slovenia (79.4%), Portugal (76.5%), and Spain (71.1%).

The next group of questions aims to gather participants' views on the effective means and channels for promoting the EU Charter as well as to probe their interest in knowing more about the Charter.

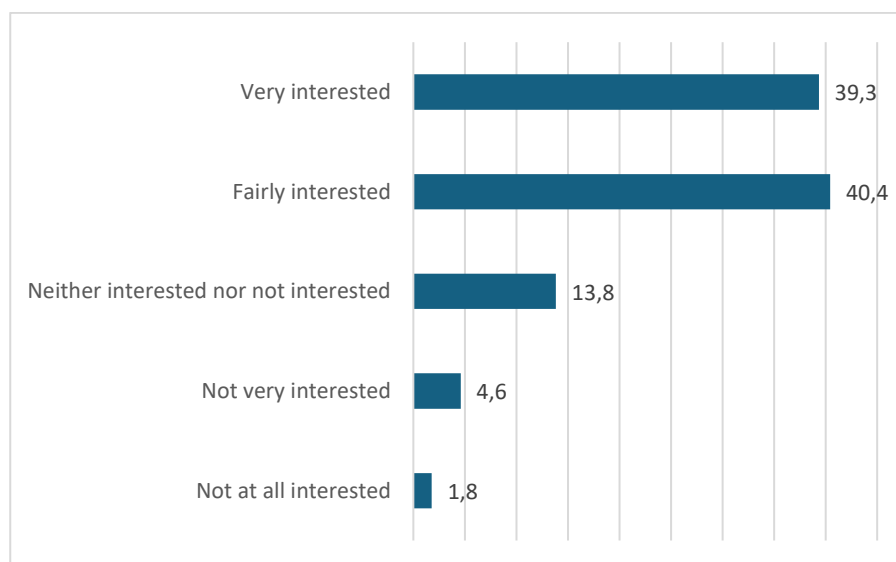
Figure 14: Interest in knowing more about the content of the EU Charter (%)

Figure 14 illustrates the level of interest expressed by respondents in receiving more information about the content of the Charter. Specifically, 35.8% indicate that they are very interested in learning more about the Charter, 41.5% are fairly interested, 15.4% are neither interested nor uninterested, 5.4% are not very interested, and 2% are not at all interested. Given that the combined total of respondents who are 'very interested' and 'fairly interested' accounts for 77.3% of all responses, it can be inferred that there is a general interest among respondents in understanding when the Charter applies, indicating high levels of interest. From an individual country perspective, respondents from Greece (52.6% very interested and 42.3% - fairly interested), Italy (40.5% interested and 50.8% - fairly interested), and Cyprus (54.2% interested and 35.1% - fairly interested) seem to be most enthusiastic to know more about the content of the Charter. Portugal's (25.5% very interested and 36.3% - fairly interested) and Bulgaria's (34.4% very interested and 47.9% - fairly interested) respondents stand out as less enthusiastic.

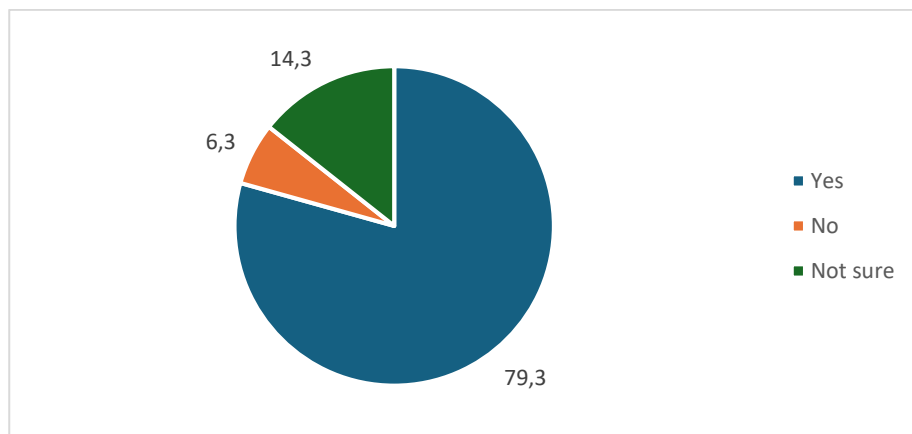
Figure 15: Interest in having more information about when the Charter applies (%)

Figure 15 illustrates the level of interest expressed by respondents in receiving more information about where the Charter applies. Specifically, 39.3% report being very interested in learning more about this aspect of the Charter, 40.4% are fairly interested, 13.8% are neither interested nor uninterested, 4.6% are not very interested, and 1.8% are not at all interested. Similar to responses for Question 14, these results indicate a strong interest in further information, with the 'very interested' and 'fairly interested' options collectively totaling 79.7%. Nevertheless, the expressed interest in knowing more about when the Charter applies is slightly higher than the interest in the Charter content. This observation is valid also at the national level for some of the countries such as Belgium, Croatia, Cyprus, Portugal and Spain.

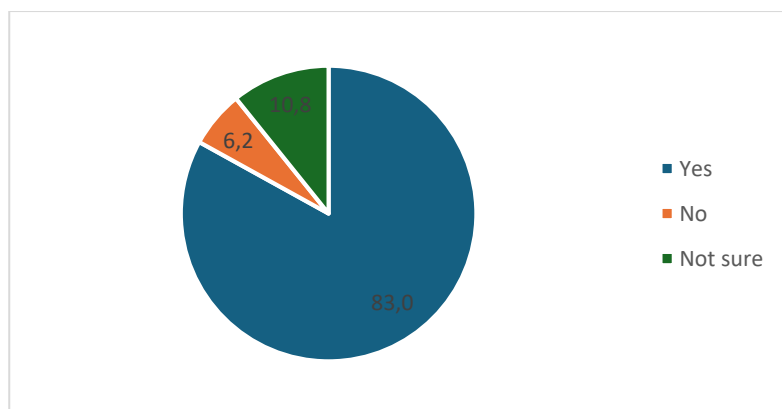
Figure 16: Do you think public events or workshops would help increase awareness of the EU Charter? (%)

Figure 16 illustrates respondents' views on whether public events and workshops would be effective in increasing awareness of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. The majority (79.3%) agree that such events would be beneficial, while only 6.3% dismiss this option, and 14.3% are uncertain about its potential benefits. At the national level, the highest number of respondents who believe that such events would be an effective measure are in Greece (89.8%) while about two-thirds (69.3%) of people in Slovenia surveyed share this opinion.

Figure 17: Do you think social media campaigns would help increase awareness of the EU Charter? (%)

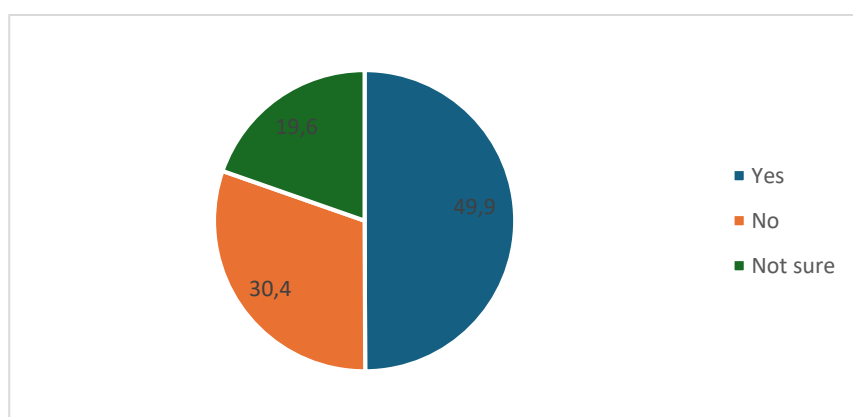

Asked about social media campaigns, respondents in the project countries are more firm about expecting a positive effect on the Charter's popularity.

Figure 17 presents respondents' views on the effectiveness of social media campaigns in raising awareness of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. The majority of respondents (83%) believe that social media campaigns would help increase awareness, while only 6.2% disagree, and 10.8% are uncertain about their effectiveness.

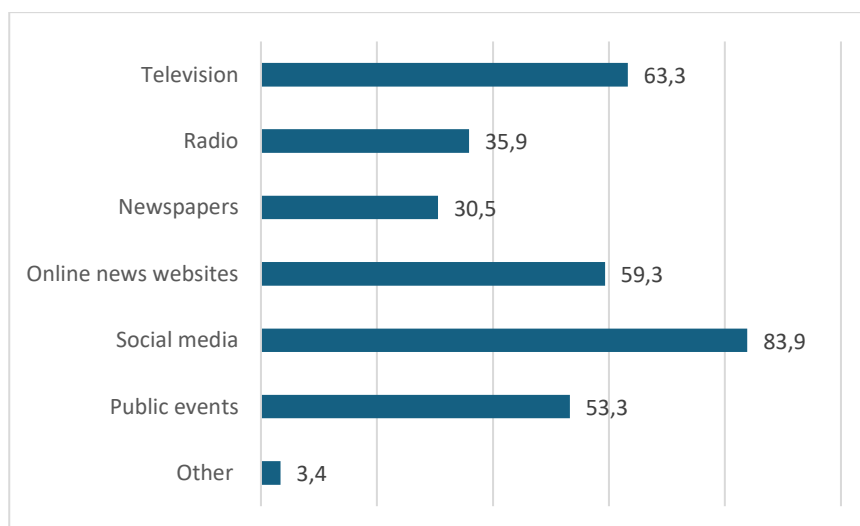
Figure 18: Would you be interested in subscribing to a newsletter about the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights? (%)

Figure 18 shows respondents' interest in subscribing to a newsletter about the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. Nearly half (49.9%) express interest, while 30.4% are not interested, and 19.6% are uncertain. However, this level of interest varies across countries. Therefore, when planning a national fundamental rights campaign, it is important to examine the specific sentiments within each country in greater detail.

Figure 19: 'Which form of media would be most effective for raising awareness about the EU Charter?'

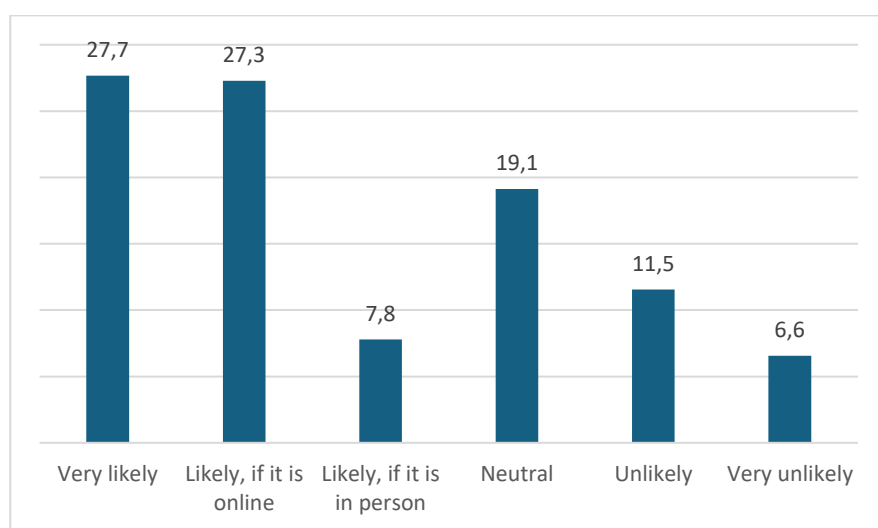

Figure 19 presents responses to Question 19: 'Which form of media do you believe would be most effective for raising awareness about the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights?' Respondents could select multiple options. The results indicate that social media is considered the most effective

platform (83.9%), followed by television (63.3%). Online news websites are selected by 59.3%, public events by 53.3%, radio by 35.9%, and newspapers by 30.5%. The 'other' category, chosen by 3.4%, includes suggestions such as educational programs, video seminars, and brochures. The responses suggest that digital media is generally perceived as more effective than traditional print media, a view further supported by the high levels of interest regarding the presumed effectiveness of digital platforms in promoting the Charter, as observed in Questions 17 and 18.

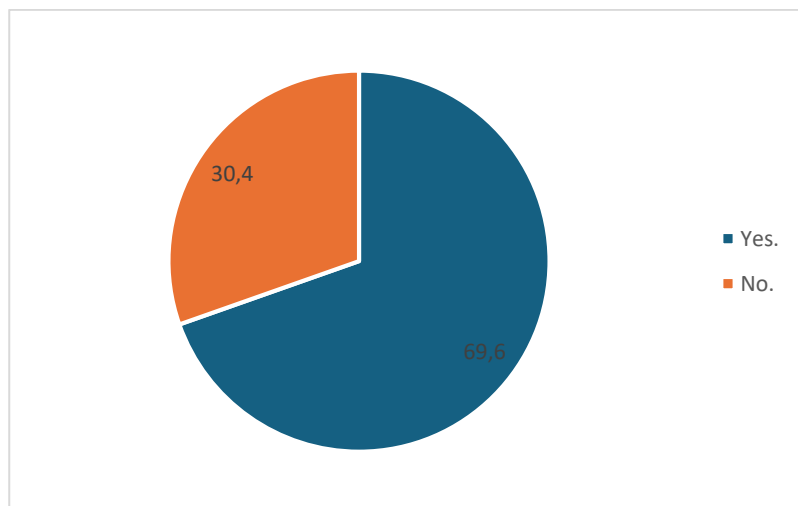
Figure 20: How likely are you to participate in a program aimed at educating persons about their rights under the Charter? (%)

Figure 20 illustrates respondents' likelihood of participating in a program designed to educate individuals about their rights under the Charter. The results indicate that 27.7% are very likely to participate, and an additional 27.3% express a preference to participate if the program is conducted online, while only 7.8% prefer an in-person format. Meanwhile, 19.1% of respondents are neutral regarding their participation, 11.5% state they are unlikely to join, and 6.6% select the 'very unlikely' option. The aggregated data shows that a total of 62.8% of respondents are open to participating in an educational program, suggesting a substantial interest in gaining information about the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights.

Figure 21 represents responses to Question 21, which asks whether respondents wish to receive information about upcoming project activities (such as news, publications, and events). A significant majority, 69.6%, express an interest in staying informed about these activities, while 30.4% do not. This indicates that, overall, respondents are interested in receiving information about the Charter and engaging further with the topic.

Conclusion

Survey data suggest a strong interest in the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights but also highlight insufficient knowledge among participants about its specifics, its use for defending fundamental rights, and processes for reporting violations.

The survey sample predominantly comprises respondents aged 30–39 and 40–49, indicating that working professionals were the primary participants. Most respondents work within public institutions or the private sector, with a majority holding university-level education. Notably, 65% of participants reported familiarity with the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights and its purpose, while a collective 93.2% regard its functions as either ‘very important’ or ‘important,’ reflecting a high level of engagement with the subject. Despite this interest, 65.8% indicated that they have not used the Charter as a reference in legal, professional, or personal contexts. Furthermore, when asked if they would know where to report a violation of their fundamental rights under the Charter, 39.8% responded negatively, and 26% expressed uncertainty. These findings underscore the need for increased promotion of the Charter, along with greater awareness of its mechanisms and practices, to ensure EU citizens are informed of their rights and capable of exercising them. Supporting this need, survey results reveal that 77.3% of respondents are interested in learning more about the Charter’s contents, 79.7% wish to know more about its applications, 62.8% are open to participating in educational programs, and 69.6% would like to stay informed about ongoing project activities.

The secondary and higher education, together with civil education and life-long learning repeatedly come up as a major factor for awareness and applicability of the Charter. On one side, the highest share of survey respondents has first heard about the document in school or university but from another side education, being school, university, ongoing or CSO-led, is repeatedly suggested as an effective means for Charter promotion.

Participants' preferences on communication channels suggest a list of effective means of communication. Despite the general trends, however, these channels enjoyed different popularity in different countries suggesting that an effective campaign should be tailored to country specifics. Country data in the annexes below may be a useful tool in this regard.
